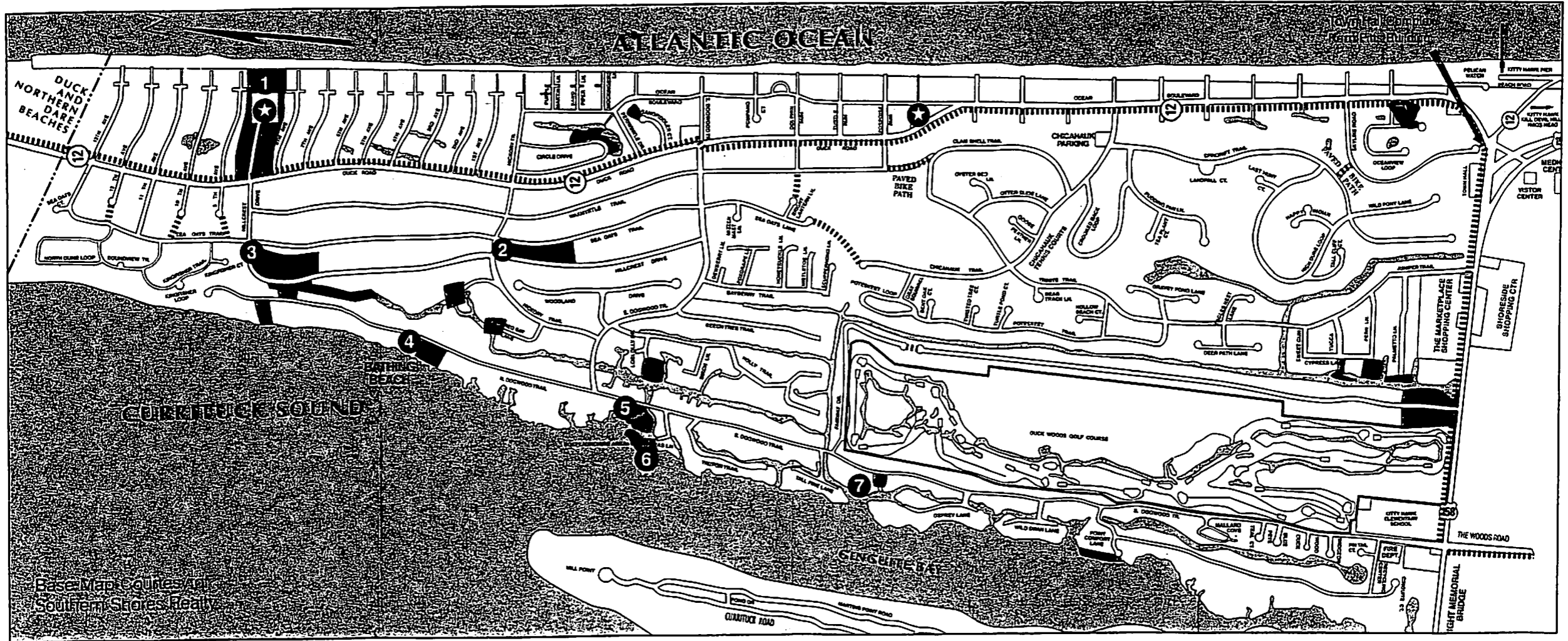

HISTORICAL BACKGROUND

The area now known as Southern Shores first came into existence through the vision of Frank Stick, who began development of the approximately 2600 acres in 1947 with the intention of forming a unique, low-density residential community within a natural setting. Originally managed by the Kitty Hawk Land Company, in 1976 the beaches, marinas and parklands were conveyed to the Southern Shores Civic Association, Inc., a non-profit, non-commercial organization dedicated to promoting the interests and welfare of its members and of the property owners and residents within the community. In 1979, by petition of its citizens, Southern Shores was incorporated as a town. The SSCA retained ownership of the common properties, including marinas, park areas, and accesses to ocean and sound, and continues to maintain and improve them as a community resource.

ORGANIZATION

The affairs of the SSCA are conducted by a nine-member Board of Directors, elected by the membership to a two-year term of office. SSCA meetings are held in the Kern Pitts Building at the Town Hall Complex. Board meetings are held on the third Thursday of each month at 7:30 PM and are open



to the membership. Member meetings are held on the second Monday in every odd-numbered month at 7:30 PM. Membership dues and marina rental fees are the major sources of revenue for the SSCA. These funds are used for administration, maintenance and improvement of the common properties, and construction of new facilities. Most of the work of the Association is done by volunteers.



FUNCTIONS



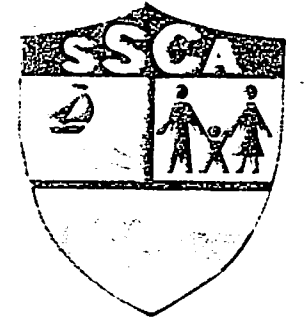
The specific functions of the SSCA are: to provide recreational amenities and preserve "green spaces" for the enjoyment of the property owners, residents and their guests; to provide a forum, through member meetings and a bi-monthly newsletter, for public discussion and exchange of information and viewpoints on civic matters affecting property owners and residents; to represent and support property owners and residents on SSCA matters in relations with government officials and agencies; and, through the services of an appointed 5-member Architectural Review Board (ARB), to enforce the protective covenants and maintain the character of building in Southern Shores by reviewing and approving new residential construction or alterations and additions to existing buildings. (The subdivisions of Chicahauk, Mallard Cove, Pelican Watch, and Fairway Drive have their own covenants and Architectural Review Boards). The Architectural Review Board meets on the second

and fourth Tuesday of each month. Building plans to be submitted for review must be in the SSCA office by noon on the Monday prior to each meeting.



Access to the ocean is provided by 34 dune crossovers, evenly spaced along the 4-mile oceanfront, and at Hillcrest Beach, located between 8th and 9th Avenues. Limited parking for ocean access is available at ~~the Oceanfront~~ at the intersection of Duck Road (NC 12) and Ocean Blvd. Hillcrest Beach has space for 72 cars, and is one of two beach areas with lifeguards in the summer season. A soundside wading beach with picnic area, children's play area, and parking is located on N. Dogwood Trail. Also on N. Dogwood is a sound overlook with seating area, providing peaceful sunset views. Sea Oats Park, at the intersection of Sea Oats Trail, Hickory Trail, and Hillcrest Drive, provides a basketball half-court, children's play area, and soccer field. Two unlit tennis courts are located at the Hillcrest Drive summit at Sea Oats Trail. Two marinas are located on S. Dogwood Trail, with boat launching available at the North Marina. The marinas are managed by the Southern Shores Boat Club. Boat Club membership is available to any SSCA member in good standing; boat ownership is not required. Parking at SSCA-owned properties is by SSCA permit only. Parking on designated Town streets is by Town-issued sticker only. There are several walk/bike trails which, in conjunction with the Town-owned trails along Hwy. 12 and Hwy 158, provide safe and relaxing routes to exercise and view the Town environs. In addition, the SSCA owns several properties which are maintained as green space, or which may be used to provide additional future recreational or community facilities.
